

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Introducing ILLiad

Interlibrary Loan is getting easier! The library has begun to install ILLiad, a new electronic interlibrary loan system. This software will allow patrons to make requests directly online, without using paper forms. Patrons will also be able to track the status of their requests themselves. In addition, electronic delivery of journal and magazine articles will resume. This will greatly speed delivery time from other libraries and allow articles to be sent directly to those patrons with email, saving them a trip to the library. We are also exploring the possibility of electronic delivery of articles already held by the library.

Software installation for ILLiad is already well underway. Training will begin after Christmas break, and we hope to have the system fully operational and available to patrons no later than the beginning of the spring term.

Please stay tuned for further announcements and more detailed instructions on how to use this system. Interlibrary borrowing by BAC students and faculty has increased greatly in the past year; we look forward to the new system making the Swedenborg Library even more efficient in responding to your needs!

CredoRef a winner



Credo Reference, an online full text reference library of 100 titles with 1,474,682 entries, was introduced in September as a new reference service from the Swedenborg Library. In a report of the usage to date we found:

- 120 searches conducted
- 321 pages of text were viewed
- 90 titles were accessed



TCLC grant awarded

As part of continuing professional development, Technical Services Librarian Carol Traveny was recently awarded a scholarship grant of \$200 from the Tri-State College Library Cooperative, TCLC, a regional consortium of over forty academic libraries, including the Swedenborg Library, makes

this award available yearly through the Continuing Education and Development Council and the Sister Mary Dennis Lynch Memorial Fund .

With the award, Carol will attend an online workshop on Local Holdings Maintenance, which covers proper

procedures and coding for attaching local holdings information to serials records. This saves time and increases access to serials by making it easier for patrons here and at other libraries to locate journal articles.

Notes from the Archives

The Archive located in the Swedenborg Library is a repository of many interesting things. Among other items, we hold the (in)famous Dining Hall Skull, the bell from one of the engines in the Great Bryn Athyn Train Wreck, and photographs of more things than you can shake a stick at. In addition, we hold many records of the Academy of the New Church and some of its founders. In short, we are the stewards of history for the Academy, the Church and the Community of Bryn Athyn.

Do you have something that belongs or will belong in the Archive? How would you know? In this series, we'll tell you what we do and what we collect. Our job at the archives is to *appraise, arrange, preserve and make available unique items of enduring historical value*. So what does that mean? In the next few issues, we'll take

you through each of these areas.

For now, we'll start with a definition. We collect "unique items of enduring historical value." By unique, we mean material that has not been published somewhere, although there are some exceptions. By "enduring historical value" we mean material evidence of the existence of mankind's activities, relationships, creations and organizations – within the scope of our mission. Items that provide this evidence include, but are not limited to, manuscripts, diaries, personal and business letters, research papers, photographs, official papers, family histories and more. All these things help us understand who we are, what we do and what we consider important.

Next issue we'll begin the process of describing what an archivist does.

Director's web site tips: Open Yale Courses

Want to study Astrophysics or Game Theory? How about taking a course on Financial Markets, which might help make some sense out of our current economic times. Did you ever want to take courses free from one of the premier universities in the world?

Open Yale Courses provides free access to undergraduate college courses taught by

leading faculty at Yale. This initiative by Yale University shares video and course materials from 15 courses with 30 additional courses to be added in the next three years. Resources such as handouts and course syllabus are offered along with class sessions, either as a text transcript, audio (MP3 files), or video (in QuickTime).

Closed-captioning for the hearing impaired is currently being added. You can complete the course just as it is offered at Yale, the only difference being no faculty/student interaction.

So all you overachieving students, independent and life-long learners, here's your opportunity to examine this user-friendly site. Meet in the

library and café with some friends and start a discussion group based on one of the courses and broaden your mind!

The “Green Books”

The result of careful collecting and painstaking research, the Academy Collection of Swedenborg Documents located in Swedenborg Library includes transcriptions and sources for most of the documents relating to the life of Swedenborg that have been discovered over the past 236 years. Over 3,000 documents amounting to more than 5,500 pages of material have been chronologically assembled in 11 large, folio albums with green covers which are also known as “The Green Books.”

Though the Collection has been an important resource for the New Church, its usefulness has been limited by the lack of access for researchers who do not live near Bryn Athyn and the difficulty in finding information within the collection. As a result, the scanning of the Collection was begun in 1997 and proceeded for several years with the

support of Charles S. Cole, Jr. and The Carpenter Fellowship Fund. The Collection was briefly available online until a technical problem caused it to be lost in “cyberspace.”

In 2007 work began on a new digital library designed to make material from the library collections available to scholars and individuals around the world. Known as the *Swedenborg Library Digital Collections*, this project has been made possible by grants from the Phoebe W. Haas Charitable Trust and the William Penn Foundation.

Grouped into three categories: *Swedenborgiana*, *New Church Literature* and *Archives*, digital material will be gradually added as the scanning progresses. The highlight of the *Swedenborgiana* section is the Academy Collection of Swedenborg Documents, which is now once again available online through the Swedenborg Library website:

In addition to educational use and private inquiry, this important resource will support the future publication of scholarly editions of Swedenborg's works and collateral studies, providing access to sources which can shed new light on Swedenborg and the world he lived in.²

Did you know we have a branch library in Sweden?

In April 2007, Interim President Brian Keith officially recognized the Stockholm General Church book collection as a branch of the Swedenborg Library. This means that records of the materials owned the Stockholm Society will be

viewable on our online catalog, thereby making them accessible to scholars all over the world.

Organizing and cataloging literally thousands of books, journals and pamphlets is no easy task, particularly for those not familiar with library procedures, who also must deal with issues of distance, technology and (sometimes) language. Luckily, an intrepid team of volunteers, headed by Eva Björkström, Gustav Fornander and Olle Björkström are more than up to the task.

After an intense training session here in October 2007, they returned to Sweden and set to work. With access to our integrated library system (Sirsi-Dynix "Workflows") they are able to add their holdings data to records of items already held by the Swedenborg Library. Title pages of items not in our catalog are scanned and along with additional information, emailed to us,

where we search for, edit or create records which are then imported into the local catalog.

As of November, over 680 items were added to existing records, in addition to 20 new

Swedenborg Library Mission Statement

The primary purpose of the Swedenborg Library is the acquisition, preservation and promotion of the New Church collections and archives for use throughout the world. These collections include books written by Swedenborg (first editions, subsequent editions and translations), copies of books known to have been owned by Swedenborg, and books and periodicals of the 17th and 18th centuries (particularly in the sciences and religion) either used by Swedenborg or reflecting the thought of his age. A collection of collateral literature covers all aspects of study of Swedenborg and the New Church. The archives are a cultural resource containing a variety of documents, letters and photographs relevant to the New Church, the Academy, and the Bryn Athyn community. The next most important use is to provide materials and information, in various forms, in support of the academic programs of the Academy schools. The library also serves as a resource for members of the local community.


